

Nanopublication – An obituary's language of legacy fits the framework's persistence claims only because almost anything would

The fit here is real but trivial: any obituary of any artist with a lasting institutional reputation would satisfy 'the invariant propagates after the emitter is gone' – the article gives no purchase on the specific mechanism the framework claims (wave, codex, overture, diffraction), only the generic fact of posthumous reputation that the vocabulary was never built to distinguish from ordinary art-historical legacy-talk. There is no edge to draw because nothing in the source resists or narrows the claim – it simply accepts anything of this shape.

WHAT THE SOURCE SAYS [1]

The article is a standard art-world obituary: it reports Mary Heilmann's death at 86, traces her biography from ceramics training under Peter Voulkos to her move into painting in New York, lists her major exhibitions (New Museum 2008, ICA Boston 1990, Whitney Biennials, Dia Beacon), quotes Dave Hickey and Ellsworth Kelly on her influence, describes a signature technique of layering a gestural under-painting with a hard-edge over-painting, and closes with her survivors and decades as a teaching professor.

WHERE THE LENS GRIPS

The only place the framework's vocabulary lands at all is the death-and-legacy frame: P15's claim that an emitter's death 'skews the system, does not end it' and P18's claim that 'the only immortality that holds is the invariant propagating through overture after overture, long after the emitter has gone' both loosely match the article's report of continued institutional circulation (collectors since 1994, decades of touring retrospectives, a Whitney show that closed months before her death, a generation of painters she is 'credited as a major influence' on). P10's 'work outlives the emitter if the material survives' matches the same facts.

WHERE IT BREAKS

Nothing – the reading reports none. The field is left empty by design: inventing an edge where the lens grips cleanly, or a grip where it fails, is the very fault this instrument exists to avoid.

PROPOSITIONAL GRID [2]

Read this grid. “Not evaluated” does **not** mean the source has nothing to say about that proposition. It means **the reading did not instruct it**. That is not a result, and it counts in no denominator. A silence, by contrast, is a finding: the reading touched the proposition without concluding, or noted its absence itself.

Remarkable silences

3 called for by what the reading found, and absent from the source.

- **P14 – The Codex as Overture**
the reading establishes that the obituary's legacy-language loosely matches persistence claims, but a mechanism-claim like Codex without any trace of 'codex' as a constructed overture is incomplete, and the reading itself notes the article gives no purchase on 'codex' at all.
- **P16 – Alterity of Reception**
the reading establishes only the generic fact of posthumous reputation, but that fit is incomplete without the specific creation-through-overture-other-than-emitter's mechanism, and the reading explicitly says the article gives no purchase on 'overture' or 'diffraction'.
- **P25 – Universal Diffraction**
the reading establishes a trivial match to persistence/legacy vocabulary, but that match is incomplete without any trace of diffraction

as the framework's universal, non-technique mechanism, and the reading explicitly states the article offers no purchase on 'diffraction'.

Overall verdict: Cheap fit — taxonomy of the August 2026 pass, predating the move to relational verdicts. Kept as metadata: the gap between the two forms is data, not residue. This reading's judgement is in the grid above.
