

Nanopublication – Shared courses, shared magazines, unlike houses – but is that synchronization or borrowed fashion?

The line is the undrawn boundary between P20's legitimate synchronized ensemble and P21's stigmatized borrowed-codex-at-scale: this source meets the surface conditions of both, and the framework supplies no internal rule to adjudicate which applies – only the source's own sympathetic tone tips the reading toward P20.

WHAT THE SOURCE SAYS [1]

A photobook documents self-built homes from Northern California's 1970s back-to-the-land movement: houses made from scrounged redwood and salvaged fixtures, rarely up to code, ranging from geodesic domes to triangular-windowed cabins to octagonal footprints. Builders learned from each other through community carpentry courses and from widely circulated publications like the Whole Earth Catalog and Shelter, yet no two houses look alike – each reflects an individual's improvisation and resourcefulness. The book pairs photographs of the surviving structures with archival material and anecdotes from the people who built and still occupy them, framed as an urgent record before this generation and its buildings disappear.

WHERE THE LENS GRIPS

P20 (Emitter Synchronization) grips concretely: builders align through shared training (carpentry courses) and shared media (Whole Earth Catalog, explicitly an 'access device' for peer-to-peer building) yet produce a wide stylistic range – domes, triangular windows, octagonal plans – without converging into a single house-type. This is a textured instance of 'coherence with variation... do not play identical,' not a bare restatement.

WHERE IT BREAKS

The same facts equally satisfy P21's stigmatized category: a codex (building philosophy, techniques, aesthetic vocabulary) disseminated at scale through popular publications is exactly what P21 calls 'borrowed codices at scale' – Fashion, counterfeit diffraction. Nothing in the framework tells us why this

movement counts as P20's legitimate synchronized ensemble rather than P21's fashion. The article pushes toward the P20 reading through valorizing language ('audacious hope,' 'independent spirit'), but that is authorial framing, not a criterion the framework itself supplies. This is contestable: a defender could say individual improvisation on top of shared technique is precisely what distinguishes synchronization from fashion – but the framework never states that rule; it only asserts the two outcomes as opposites.

PROPOSITIONAL GRID [2]

Read this grid. “Not evaluated” does **not** mean the source has nothing to say about that proposition. It means **the reading did not instruct it**. That is not a result, and it counts in no denominator. A silence, by contrast, is a finding: the reading touched the proposition without concluding, or noted its absence itself.
