Who Is the Excluded Third in Toy Story 5?

The article appears to examine how Toy Story 5 structures its narrative through logical exclusion – a formal constraint that shapes what can and cannot be said within the diegetic world. This is a CODEX operating at the level of narrative logic itself: the film emits through a self-imposed system of what positions are permissible, what conflicts can be staged, what resolutions are structurally available. The 'excluded third' is not a thematic content but a FORMAL INVARIANT – the latent rule governing which possibilities the narrative aperture can receive. When a viewer encounters this constraint, they may initially read surface conflict (Jessie vs. Woody), but the ricochet occurs when the underlying logical structure becomes visible – the film's intentional invariant reveals itself, and the first reading re-

fracts into a second: 'Ah, this is not about toy rivalry; this is about what the narrative form itself forbids.' This is engineering diffraction through formal constraint.
