

Nazi Looting and the Broken Chain of Intentional Invariants

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French Museum Launches 'Wanted' Campaign to Track Down 424 Artworks Looted by Nazis

Nazi looting severs the codex. Each stolen artwork carries an intentional invariant – the artist's systematic constraints, the logic of why **these** forms, **these** colors, according to what internal coherence. When a painting vanishes into private hands or destruction, that invariant becomes orphaned: the work still exists as physical material (the physical invariant holds), but the **dialogue** between emitter and receiver is interrupted. The receiver cannot diffract through the artist's overture because the chain of transmission is broken. The museum's 'Wanted' campaign is not merely about restitution – it is about restoring the **possibility of diffraction**. A looted work in hiding cannot generate creation in any receiver. The campaign treats recovery as an epistemic act: recovering the work means recovering the conditions under which its intentional invariant can again activate in dialogue. This is why the loss is not merely material – it is a loss of generative capacity itself.
